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Lithium-Ion Battery Safety

Raise your hand if you own a device that has a lithium-ion battery. You may want to set your phone down to do this. Lithium-ion batteries are found in smoke alarms, laptops, toys, e-bikes, e-cigarettes, just to name a few. The problem with these batteries is that they store a large amount of energy in a small space. The problems occur when they are not used in the right manner. For instance, using a battery from another device, other than the one it came with, or charging your device with an aftermarket off brand charging cable. This can cause overheating, fire and may even cause the battery to explode.

Here are some safety tips to consider and share with others:

- Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory, i.e., UL.
- Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- Put batteries in the device the right way.
- Only use the charging cord that came with the device or purchase a new cord from the manufacturer.
- Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on your couch.
- Do not keep charging the device or battery after it is fully charged.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32*F or above 105*F.

How do you know a battery is suspect? If there are any changes in odor, color change, too much heat, change in shape, leaking or odd noises; move the device away from anything that can catch fire until it cools down. Do not throw batteries in the trash, they need to be recycled. And do not put discarded batteries in a pile.

<u> 2023 Grant County Fire District #3 Operations Lid Lift Information</u>

About the Levy:

Grant County Fire Protection District No. 3 provides its citizens emergency fire protection and emergency medical services. The maximum regular levy rate for Washington fire districts is \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value. Due to the statutory 1% limitation on property tax increases, the Fire District's current levy rate has dropped to \$.65 per thousand. The District previously levied at the rate of \$1.10 per thousand in 2013.

If approved by the voters, this proposition will authorize the District to establish its regular real property tax levy rate at \$1.30 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation in 2023 for collection in 2024 and will allow the District to keep pace with inflation by authorizing a six percent limit factor for the following five years. The dollar amount levied in the final year shall serve as the District's future tax levy base.

The Board of Commissioners has determined that the tax levy and the revenue it will produce is necessary to maintain and improve the current level of services, firefighter staffing, equipment, and facilities and to purchase updated apparatus to continue to provide services for the protection of life and property in the growing District and to enhance public safety.

Why Support the Levy?

<u>Safety and Emergency Response:</u>

The levy is crucial for maintaining a highly trained and adequately staffed fire district, enabling prompt emergency response to protect lives, property, and the environment.

<u>Equipment and Technology Upgrades:</u>

The levy funds will be used to acquire and maintain state-of-the-art firefighting equipment, vehicles, communication systems, and other necessary technologies.

<u>Training and Education:</u>

The levy ensures that our firefighters receive ongoing training and education to stay updated on the latest firefighting techniques, safety protocols, and emergency medical services and enhance their ability to serve the community effectively.

Fire Prevention and Public Education:

The levy will support fire prevention programs, including smoke detector installations, fire safety education in schools, community outreach initiatives, and fire inspections to mitigate potential risks and promote public safety.

<u>Facility Maintenance and Upgrades:</u>

The levy will provide resources to maintain and upgrade fire stations, ensuring a safe and efficient work environment for firefighters and preserving our community's valuable infrastructure.

Accountability and Transparency:

Oversight: The utilization of levy funds will be subject to strict financial oversight and accountability measures, ensuring that the resources are used as intended.

Reporting: The Fire District will provide regular reports on the allocation and expenditure of levy funds, offering transparency to the community regarding how their tax dollars are being utilized.

Independent Audit: An independent audit of the Fire District's finances will be conducted periodically to ensure adherence to financial regulations and proper management of funds.
